A percentage of these are examples of skylarking with burnouts being done by some older drivers. Other examples have been dedicated to a particular event, including even a gender reveal! This appears to expose an underlying general tone and / or culture of dangerous and reckless behaviour.

Hooning is a safety risk for those driving, those on or near the road, and for those spectators who are often cheering the act whilst filming. The human cost of this behaviour can have catastrophic consequences as the margin for error is minimal. There is plenty of evidence online showing how badly things can go wrong.

This sort of behaviour is illegal and dangerous. Once the traction of the tyre is lost, the car is out of control. So deliberately provoking this situation, especially on public roads is just asking for trouble.

We can, and we must, shift our focus to the human factors and social norms that influence these attitudes and behaviours. Together, we can work towards a Fatality Free Future.

Road Toll Update

721 people have sadly already died on Australian roads this year. This number represents a 6.8% increase in the number of road fatalities at the same time last year and includes drivers, motorcyclists, passengers, pedestrians and cyclists. South Australia has shown the greatest increase in road deaths of 65.1% compared to the same period in 2022.

Rural Road Safety

While less than a third of Australia's population live outside major cities, road deaths in these regional areas accounted for almost two thirds (65%) of last year's road toll.


Rural road safety isn't just a concern for the people who live there, but also those visiting or travelling through.
