team travelling around the country and visiting regional areas promoting Rural Road Safety Month. This work could not be more important with road trauma rates growing at unacceptable levels. More concerning is that these trends appear to be getting worse.

With the release of the 2023 AAMI Crash Index:

Australia's worst crash hot spots revealed, it was no surprise to read that 'Nose-to-tail' are the most common type of crash at the majority of the top hotspots throughout Australia. Friday remains the most common day and afternoons are the worst time for accidents nationally.

Many road crashes are avoidable. Whether the label is driver distraction or lack of attention, as road users and operators of a vehicle we need to have our minds on the job at hand, travel at a safe distance and drive to the conditions – that's weather, road and/or traffic conditions. Following too closely or tailgating, and impatience are risky road behaviours which we can control.

As we transition from Rural Road Safety Month (Sep) into National Safe Work Month (Oct), it seems the frequency of media reports of multiple fatality crashes is escalating. After spending time, during Rural Road Safety Month, with people who have lost loved ones and first responders, we must be reminded of the ripple effect of road trauma and make a concerted effort not to become accepting of road crash fatalities.

We all, as individuals, must choose to make a difference for the better on our roads as we strive together for a Fatality Free Future.

Latest Statistics

Road Toll Update

838 people have sadly died on Australian roads this year. This number represents a 9% increase in the number of road fatalities at the same time last year.

South Australia has shown the greatest increase in road deaths of 60.4% compared to the same

period in 2022. Cyclist deaths

have also increased by 76.5%.

Heavy Vehicles

During the 12 months to the end of June 2023, 180 people lost their lives in crashes involving heavy vehicles (a decrease of 7.2%) and 22 people lost their lives in crashes involving buses (an increase of 37.5%) when compared to the corresponding 12-month period one year prior.

The national launch was held at GIO Stadium Canberra, where the stadium seats served as a powerful representation of the more than 26,000 deaths on Australian roads over the last 20 years. The display also included 1,188 flowers to represent the lives lost in 2022. Nigel and Jody Smith spoke of losing their 18 year old



son Lachlan in an horrific crash, highlighting the ripple effect of road trauma.

Joining ARSF at Royal Adelaide Hospital was Jack Annear, survivor of a crash that killed three of his friends and left Jack with serious injuries to overcome. SA Minister for Police, Emergency Services & Correctional Services, Joe Szakacs, Royal Adelaide Hospital Associate Professor Dan Ellis and Suncorp's Executive Manager CTM Claims, Curtis McKay, all emphasised the importance of road safety resilience and being adequately prepared.

The team then moved to Peacehaven Park in Toowoomba where the display highlighted the 297 lives tragically lost on Queensland's roads in 2022. Tegan Douglas courageously shared the story of losing her 8 year old daughter Olivia to road trauma - an unimaginable loss.

Thank you to all the individuals, businesses and community organisations who contributed to the success of this campaign by hosting local events and creating displays with their road safety promises. Together, we urge all road users to continue to share the 'Respect the Road' message across Australia.



SubiNats - 30 September 2023




