

BUILDING ROAD SAFETY RESILIENCE FOR A FATALITY FREE FUTURE



The 2023 road toll reveals a distressing trend that highlights the desperate need for a concerted effort to reduce the road toll and the impact road trauma creates in our communities.

While police enforcement, improvements to infrastructure and vehicle safety are crucial, personal responsibility and attitudes toward safety play equally vital roles.

There is a prominent surge in risky behaviour, impatience and aggression on our roads. Research and feedback from drivers reveal a concerning focus on getting caught and paying a fine rather than putting others' lives at risk!

We as individual road users must reflect on the choices we make on and around the road. A shift in road safety culture is urgently needed to promote tolerance, respect and situational awareness.

What can we do to achieve this? We can upskill ourselves, our communities, our workplaces, and our young people to become more road safety resilient. We can take personal responsibility for our role in road safety in 2024 and beyond.

Latest Statistics

2023 Road Toll

1,273 lives were lost on Australian roads last year, representing a 7.9% increase in the number of road fatalities. Compared to 2022, South Australia showed the greatest increase in deaths followed by Victoria and New South Wales.

- More than half the lives lost were not drivers
- 62% of fatalities occurred during the day
- 102 school aged lives were lost

Heavy Vehicles

During the 12 months to the end of December 2023, 169 people died in crashes involving heavy trucks (a decrease of 1.2% compared to 2022) and 18 people lost their lives in crashes involving buses

Slow Down Songs

102 school-aged lives were tragically lost on our roads in 2023*. The keys to reducing this number and saving lives are in our hands, which is why we're partnering up with AAMI once again to encourage Australians to drive safely in and around school zones for our *Slow Down Songs*

campaign.

The campaign runs throughout the first term of the school year, rolling out across Queensland, New South Wales, and South Australia on Spotify. With the use of geo-targeting, listening drivers will be alerted when entering within five kilometres of a school zone by dramatically slowing down a song and serving safety reminders.

First Nations Road Safety Summit & NSW Road Safety Forum

ARSF attended two industry forums in Sydney this month with representatives from organisations that support and rely on advancing road safety for all road users.

The First Nations Road Safety Summit, hosted by the Assistant Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, Senator the Hon Carol Brown, focused on issues relating to the priority area of First Nations Road Safety. Topics included culturally relevant education and messaging, gaps in data

collection and research, and understanding the impacts of road trauma on First Nations people and communities. The discussions will inform current and future road safety policy, build a network for ongoing dialogue and inform the development of future programs.



The NSW Road Safety Forum brought together more than 90 road safety experts and stakeholders to discuss road trauma in both Regional and Metropolitan areas, emerging trends and the increase of risky road behaviours. New initiatives were identified, as well as options to accelerate actions in the 2026 Road Safety Action Plan. Building Road Safety Resilience

Road safety is up to all of us. We can upskill ourselves, our communities, our workplaces, and our young people to become more road safety resilient.

Every road user must reflect on the choices they make on and around the road – the keys to road safety are in all our hands.

When sharing the road with vulnerable road users, drivers and riders should:

- Scan the road ahead
- Check mirrors and blind spots before making manoeuvres
- Take extra care when approaching areas with vulnerable road users
- See and be seen make eye contact with other road users
