This urgency for a shift in road safety culture was also shown in the rise in fatalities on our roads over the Easter weekend.

We urgently need to address the increasing road toll and improve road safety culture. Whatever type of road user you are, take responsibility for yourself and others on the road.

Latest Statistics

Road Toll Update

320 lives have been lost on our roads this year, a 4.6% increase on the same period in 2023. Pedestrians deaths have also increased by 62%.

In the 12 months to the end of March 2024, there was a 38% increase in fatalities on roads that had a posted speed limit of 50 km/h.



Road Safety Resilience Tips

Road safety is up to all of us. We can upskill ourselves, our communities, our workplaces, and our young people to become more road safety resilient.

Every road user must reflect on the choices they make on and around the road – the keys to road safety are in all our hands.

When using rideables, you should:

- Wear bright or reflective clothing and a helmet
- Ensure you and your rideable are fit for the journey
- Use bells and lights
- Be aware of your surroundings and avoid distractions
- Make eye contact with other road users
